Further information

Alfred Walker came to the Eromanga District from Nyngan. He started as a jackeroo on Mount Margaret which was owned by his uncle at that time. He later became the local Superintendent of the Rabbit Board Fence. He married Lydia Tubb in Sydney in March 1897 and they lived in Eromanga. In 1914, he drew Cranstoun in the land ballot. This block had been cut off from the greater Mount Margaret lease. Alfred Walker continued on the Rabbit Proof Fence at the same time running the station with his family.

Cranstoun Station remains in the Walker Family to this day.

In about 1974, the headstone was repaired by long-term opal miner John Kelly. John Kelly's son Mike provided the following information: "I can recall driving up to Fort Hill Mine and seeing a car rapidly driving away. We discovered Peter's brass plaque just about torn off its original mount. Dad took it and had a better mount brazed to the back of the plaque and then he remounted the plaque in a new concrete block. I also recall reading in a related text (cannot recall the origin) that Peter had been reported as being ill—'he had some trouble with the waterworks' was the quote. He died soon after."

A Journey with Colour. A History Of Queensland Opal 1869-1979

The author was inspired by the remnants of an old grave among the Fort Mines, at Stoney Creek, with a metal tag wired to a rotting pole, inscribed with these words:

"Peter Boylan, 69 yrs, died 1906; erected by his brother Lawrence."

Oh, Peter Boylan, 69, I'm looking for your opal mine; No doubt your brother Lawrence, too, Stood here thinking as I do! T'was in your blood the same as mine To wander o'er the hills of time, Seeking for the treasured Gem And finding such a few of them! I traced your steps, your camping ground, The very place you slept I found Your camel pads led me this way, Only just the other day -Now fifty years and more have passed Since you lay down, and slept your last. You sank your shaft through sandstone rock, And sometimes worked around the clock -No man can stop when gemstones gleam, Out from a fiery sandstone seam! -And underneath the gypsum line The pay dirt-boulder you would find. You sat upon your rock to rest, And figured how to work it best: You'd switch a little bit around, And send your mate down underground, Never can a braceman find An idle moment on a mine! Soon as you felt it good to stop You'd hear a voice call out, "On top!" The windlass creaks, she comes up slow, You'd sing out "Coming down, below." The dirt you'd shovel all away, The same as I have done today; You'd drink the water from the bag, Wipe off the sweat with that old rag -You've specked around the eyes as keen As my eyes have ever been; You'd pick-up colours here and there, Spit off the dust to lay them bare... Peter I can see you still Prospecting there upon this hill!

Peter Boylan was prospecting for opal on Yowah Station, in 1884.

Thargomindah Herald, 23 August 1884:

On the 12th instant, before Mr Brookes JP, Mr Hutchison, manager of Cobb and Co's Yowah Station, summoned Peter Boylan for trespassing. It appears that Boylan, who is a miner, was on the Yowah run prospecting for opals.

Boylan holds a miner's right, and many people have manifested a great interest in the case as they are mostly of the opinion that the holder of a miner's right can prospect where he chooses.

Unfortunately the case had to be postponed, owing to the none-arrival of the Police Magistrate at Eulo, from Cunnamulla. The case is to be tried on the 18th instance. Boylan in the meantime, pursues vocation as if nothing has happened. Opal mining seems to be the rage once more. There are no less than three parties going to try their luck in that direction. They started out some days ago, and we hope they will be successful.

Editor: We think the powers conferred by a miner's right are generally misunderstood. A "right" gives the holder the power to search for minerals, but does not in our opinion justify him in allowing his horse and cattle to trespass on a run.

The death of Peter Boylan, Eromanga police, 9 November 1906:

* Constable O'Connor begs to report: On the 6th instant, the Stoney Creek mailman arrived in Eromanga and informed me that Peter Boylan was dying at Stoney Creek. He also gave me a letter written by a miner named Cunningham from there which urgently requested me to come to Stoney creek and take care of Boylan's property, as he believed he wouldn't last any more than a few more hours.

I left Eromanga with my black tracker the same day, and arrived at Stoney Creek that night at 8 o'clock' after travelling 50 miles. Boylan had died eight hours before we arrived. Some of the miners informed me that he has been suffering for years with water blockages, and about two weeks ago he hurt his testicles on the pommel of his saddle, and from all appearances, inflammation set in. When I examined the body they were as big as a football, which possibly caused his death. I could find no suspicious circumstances, and everything possible was done to save his life. On the 7th instant at 7 pm, myself, the tracker and three miners buried him at the mines. He left no will, and his property consists of four horses, an old riding saddle, a pack saddle, a new bridle, one Winchester rifle, one revolver, two small parcels of opal, a rolled gold watch and chain, two shirts and 15/6 in cash.

He was a native of South Australia and has relatives living there. I have informed the curator that his property is valued at £50.

Summarised from A Strange Bird on the Lagoon by his granddaughter Margaret Reeves:

"In 1928, Beauchamp Cameron had a stroke. His daughters Helen and Isobel would prepare a pack of provisions ready for him to go back to his hut on 'Moombidary' at Quilpie near Bourke. Beauchamp was much happier this way than being cooped up in an old-peoples home. He died there and was buried by his sons Billy and Matey Cameron. They placed the grave on the stock route so that they would always have access to it. Later they erected a monument with a marble plaque."

<u>December 2019</u>: According to Scott Clifford, current Manager of 'Moombidary', the only grave on the station is that of five year-old William Cameron who was killed in the cattle yards in 1943. Sometime after that, the Camerons sold up and went to Aramac. All the 'Moombidary' records were destroyed in a fire in 1984.

Comment: Margaret Reeves (who lived in Sydney) was mistaken on two counts:

- She located 'Moombidary' at Quilpie near Bourke NSW. It is in fact near Hungerford, QLD.
- She has Beauchamp Cameron buried of 'Moombidary'... some 300 km south of the actual grave site.





Further information

Born Effy May Hunter in Berrawinia NSW, she married Albert Jacka at 'Keeroongooloo' when she was 19 years old. Sometime later, she and her husband Albert Jacka took up 'Tallyabra', to the east of Eromanga.

She had three children at the time of her death: Elizabeth May Jacka (6), Margie Ethel Jacka (5) and William Albert Robert Jacka (3).

Her official Death Certificate states that the cause of death was 'gun shot wound in the head'. Legend has it that the accident occurred when she was climbing over a fence with a loaded shot gun.


